Cemetery Beautification Project

Toba Inlet and Squirrel Cove

You may have noticed earlier this fall, wooden stakes placed in the Squirrel Cove Cemetery. These markers are the result of an underground penetrating radar survey that helped identify ancestors buried in the cemetery but not visible from the surface. Ninety-eight sites were located adding to the 168 graves already noted. A similar project was undertaken at Toba Inlet Cemetery where forty-two ancestors were identified.
